

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## Minister's Letter

### Be Thou My Vision

The words 'vision' and 'seeing/sight' are very often considered the same and used interchangeably, even though they are distinct processes. Sight refers to the eyes' ability to detect light and transmit signals to the brain using rods and cones, which is what Optometrists check during appointments. Vision, on the other hand, involves the brain interpreting these signals, engaging various regions to assign meaning, value, and emotional response to what is seen. This complex process allows us to understand and interact with our environment, highlighting that vision is a comprehensive brain function, not just a sensory one.

My beloved father, who was passionate about reading and writing, lost his sight twenty years before he passed away. During his final visit to Moorfields Eye Hospital, he was told there was little that could be done to prevent him from going completely blind. True to this prognosis, a few years later he described himself as having been "shut out from the world". However, in those 'dark' years, he always insisted that God was his true vision. Remarkably, even after losing his physical sight, my father's spiritual vision seemed to grow stronger. Until his passing at the age of 93, he often sensed who was entering his room, and on numerous occasions, he shared with us dreams and messages from God, some of which have come to pass; reminding us often: "Be thou my vision."

'Seeing' in the Gospel of John is intricately linked to faith, belief and the divine revelation of Jesus, emphasising that true understanding comes from spiritual insight rather than mere physical sight. The experiences of Nathanael (John 1: 45-50) and Thomas (John 20: 24-29) involved various aspects of seeing and resulted in transformation. During the supper that followed the walk to Emmaus (Luke 24: 30-32), Cleopas and the other disciple experienced an epiphany when their eyes were opened and they recognised Jesus. This evolution resulted in them immediately returning to Jerusalem to share the truth of Jesus' resurrection with the other disciples.

One of the verses of StF 668, a hymn based on George Herbert's poem, 'The Elixir', has always stayed with me. It goes:

A man that looks on glass,  
On it may stay his eye;  
Or if he pleaseth, through it pass,  
And then the heav'n espy.

Herbert, in this verse, highlights the theme of seeing beyond and conjures a sense that there is more to be revealed in the ordinary and everyday things of life than meets the eye. Glass allows light to pass through, but it can also blur or hide what lies beyond it. We can look at glass, or we can look through it. I imagine Herbert was influenced by St Paul's words, "now we see as through a glass, darkly: but then face to face" (1 Cor. 13: 12). For Herbert, God was like the light shining behind the glass – the illumination that brings clarity to us and to the world.

As this new year unfolds, let us claim Paul's powerful prayer for the Ephesians as our own: "I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened so that you grasp the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, and his incomparably great power for us who believe." (Ephesians 1: 18) Let Christ be both our light and our vision - guiding, illuminating, revealing and transforming our journey each day.

"Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart..."

## Reducing the Risk: Trinity's charity for 2025

Congratulations to all those who contributed in 2025 to the raising of £1500 for 'Reducing the Risk'! In the last few years, Trinity has alternated support for a local charity with that for a national or international charity.

In 2024, Deacon Selina suggested a charity the church might consider was 'Reducing the Risk'. This is an Oxfordshire-based charity which supports victims of domestic violence, both men and women. It aims to increase the safety and wellbeing of adults and children who are at risk through domestic abuse and to protect people who are vulnerable to abuse and exploitation. It also aims to prevent such abuse by promoting good practice and multi-agency partnership,

During her time in Abingdon, Selina worked with many community organisations including the Toddlers' Group, work in schools and with the army base, and supporting children, young people and their families in so many ways. She provided support in practical ways as well as giving to many, both in the Circuit and in the wider community, both spiritual comfort and pastoral care.

At Selina's last Church Meeting at Trinity in July 2025, Georgina said that Selina's presence at Trinity had been a great blessing. She would not be forgotten, and she was leaving a huge legacy. Part of that legacy has been her support of local charities and those in need in the local community – and of course her support for 'Reducing the Risk'.

We have sent a message to Selina, who is now working in the Salisbury Circuit, to let her know the final total and to thank her for suggesting the charity.

#### **Volunteer from home or with us in Trinity Church for Experience Easter**

**Easter**-we are starting to plan for Experience Easter 2026, which will offer schools the choice to visit Trinity Church for live workshops or to take part online. ## *Greetings from Sierra Leone!*

I am writing from my cabin on board the 'Global Mercy', a big hospital ship run by the Christian charity 'Mercy Ships' which provides free surgery for people in Africa. This week I will begin operating on children with extreme leg deformities that make it hard for them to walk.

The team on board are amazing- a bunch of truly committed people willing to come and work for free and 'go the extra mile' which means I find being here to be a breath of fresh air, despite the hard work.

This last week I reviewed around 50 patients that we operated on last year. They were all super happy to be back on board, and there were lots of hugs and 'high fives', and we were happy with the outcomes of the surgeries.

A visit to a local children's hospital yesterday brought home to me the stark contrast between ship life and the country we serve. It was noisy, crowded and hot. Three babies to a bed. There was a poster on display giving statistics- 30% of children in Sierra Leone under age 5 are stunted, only 9% of children aged 6-23 months were fed a minimum acceptable diet in the day or night preceding the interview. 68% of children age 6-59 months and 47% of women aged 15-49 are anaemic, and so on.

The ship on the other hand is air conditioned (to the point where patients will often be sat in bed wearing woolly hats while it is 30 degrees outside!) and everything is state of the art.

But looking forward to the week ahead: I am excited to see the children transform. Not only do we get their legs straight, but they begin to smile and then to make friends. At this point the ward comes alive with chatter and laughter and often music and spontaneous songs.

## Induction of Revd Wayne Hawkins as Oxfordshire Ecumenical Minister

Trinity Church, Abingdon, welcomed people from across England and Wales on Saturday 10th January as Revd Wayne Hawkins was inducted as Oxfordshire Ecumenical Minister for the URC Wessex Synod. The service was led by the Moderator, Revd Dr Michael Hopkins, with contributions from ministers and church leaders from across the county.



The preacher was Revd Dr Susan Durber, URC minister and European President of the World Council of Churches. In her sermon she reflected on the ecumenical movement and Abingdon's long tradition of churches working together. She recalled the progress in ecumenical cooperation, especially during the 1970s and 1980s when new forms of partnership emerged and the United Reformed Church was formed through the coming together of different traditions. Today, she said, people are far more familiar with one another's church practices, but that has not yet led to the kind of deep structural unity anticipated in those earlier years.

Drawing on the readings from Philippians (2: 5-11) and John(13:34-35), she spoke of Jesus' command to love one another, stressing that love is not just a feeling but something practical and lived out day by day. True unity, she suggested, grows when Christians commit themselves to love in their relationships with one another within and across churches.

During the service Revd Wayne Hawkins affirmed his faith and his commitment to serve the local ecumenical partnership (LEP) churches of Oxfordshire in this ecumenical role in helping them in their missions to their communities. Representatives of local ecumenical partnerships, Wessex Synod and the wider



church formally welcomed him and promised their support and prayers. The service concluded with prayers for the churches and the world, by Canon Neil Roberts, Rector of St Nicolas Church, Guildford. He was sorry to lose Wayne Hawkins who had been a fellow minister in Guildford but said people in Oxfordshire would be blessed through his work in this new ecumenical role.



Revd Wayne Hawkins concluded with the blessing:  
God  
Creator, Son and Spirit  
Hold us now in the place where we belong,

Bless us now as we open our eyes,  
To see one another as your beloved people,  
To see your image set in each one of us,
