



WHAT'S BEEN GOING ON

Cakes and Ale Festival, 16 May 2026, Abingdon – Sally Mears

I was inspired to do a Cakes and Ale Festival in Abingdon following a talk I went to entitled 'Drunk monks and a lake of beer' - it seems that Anglo-Saxons liked ale and it was very important for marking special occasions – and a cakes and ale festival I attended based on this. I knew that God was calling me to do something similar in Abingdon as a one-off, even if I didn't quite know how to go about it. Then I made contact with Clare Calnan who wanted to promote St Edmund of Abingdon's c.850th Anniversary so I suggested we hold a festival in his honour.

St Edmund was instrumental in preventing a Civil War. He was also a celebrated son of the Church. We don't know much about what St Edmund looked like, but the emaciated bronze statue by Robert Munday at Teddy Hall shows that he definitely needed some cake and ale! He is holding a crucifix as he always did when reading and teaching. He is the Patron Saint of St Edmund's Hall, Oxford University. For further info, go to:

I set about asking local people to help, such as:

- Debbie Garrod to make a historical recipe cake
- Loose Cannon to make a special ale
- The Gerontius Amenity Fund who were keen to do a cake stall in the Market Place
- Ros Steel, Curate at Christ Church
- The Oxfordshire House of Prayer, based in Abingdon, who led on a project called Living Waters, in St Helen's Church – a 12-foot high waterfall made out of material that could be painted with prophetic texts. I found a watery connection to our chosen Saint in Will Donaldson's book 'The Servant Heart'. As he lay dying (on 16 November 1240 in France) he was heard to repeat Isaiah 12 v.3: 'With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation' noted by his Chaplain, Eustace of Faversham, present at his bedside. These words, which reflect the depths of his faith in God and his prayer for the church, are now engraved in Latin around the well head at the centre of the medieval quad of Teddy Hall, the site of his early career as an academic.

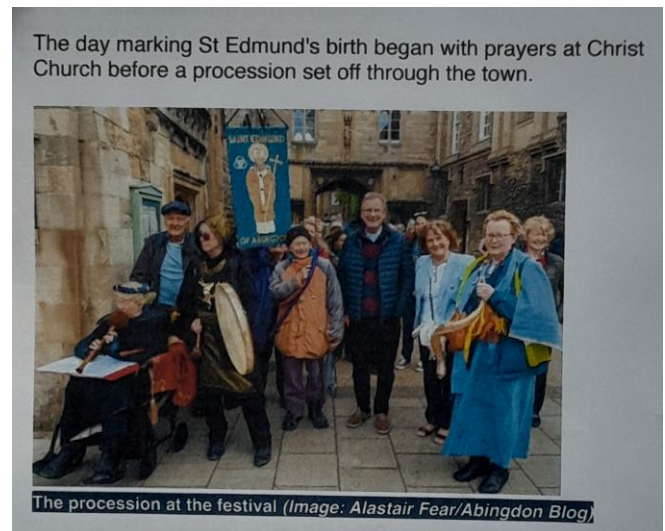
My chosen charity for the festival was TAB (The Abingdon Bridge), supporting young people's mental health, as well as raising funds for the churches around town as my vision was to have music, dance, art and creative worship going on to draw people into sacred spaces for fun activities. The buildings used were Christ Church, St Nicolas Church, St Michael's and All Angels' Church, St Helen's Church, the Salvation Army and, of course, Our Lady and St Edmund Church. This expanded to include the Market Place, St Ethelwold's Garden and One Planet Abingdon Climate Emergency Centre.

We opened our small but beautifully formed festival with prayer at Christ Church, before setting off on a mini pilgrimage into town, led by Penny Terry playing the medieval Bladder Pipe and her friend on a drum and me blowing a shofar while people held a beautifully embroidered banner of St Edmund. We looked in on St Edmund Church and sang his hymn, read his prayer and looked at the wall plaque. When we arrived

at St Nicolas Church, we were greeted by friendly Vikings, the Ulfhrafnar reenactment group. Will Donaldson gave a talk on the life and legacy of St Edmund. Next there was a walk led by Dr Philip Kenrick on the Lost Abbey. In the afternoon, there was a historical walk from St Ethelwold's House led by Anne Dodd followed by a biodiversity walk within the beautiful gardens by John Killick.

Markus Gabriel Ecseghy gave a piano recital at St Michael's followed by the Ceilidh. There were also musicians and dancers in the Market Place, heralded by the Town Crier, including the Abingdon Morris dancers, St Nicolas bell ringers, Abingdon Music Centre's choir ACCORD, a classic jazz pianist, Nick Gill and many other groups such as the JAM band, the Pearly Gates Gospel Choir and an up-and-coming local Indie Band, Karvara. Elizabeth Mitchell led Circle Dancing on St Michael's Labyrinth and Christine Mather crocheted some fine monks! The following day, there were more art opportunities and a Choral Evensong in St Helen's Church, superbly organised by the organist, Dr Peter Foster.

There were lots of blessings, new friends right across all the churches and towns people. It was a truly unifying day that will stay with the town for a very long time... annually to have a minor celebration for ALL the town to celebrate every one of its saints and to feel proud to have an internationally famous churchman and statesman who is also a Saint. St Edmund is a historical figure who can unify across all faiths and none. These days we need it more than ever! Hundreds of people of faith and no faith were involved and enjoyed the day. Thank you if you were one of them!

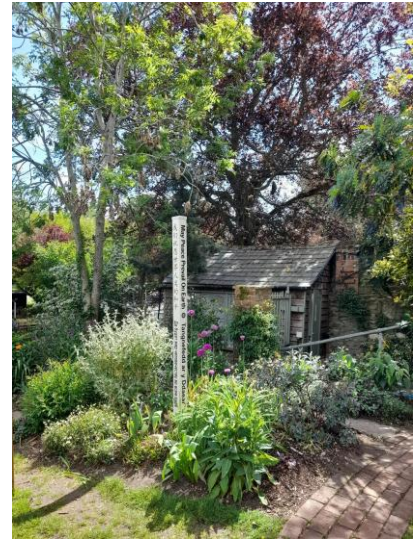


- 13 July - Pam Pratt and Linda King bring a selection of songs and music on guitar and keyboard. The retiring collection will be for the Macintyre charity.
